Rockette Tutors Timeless Tappers

Janet Murphy loves dancing and loves teaching the Timeless Tappers who perform not only at many local events but have hit the big time at N.Y. State Fair and international conventions.

"My ladies know I'd do anything for them," says the former Radio City Rockette, who still has the figure and form of those fine performers of international renown. She not only teaches the Timeless Tappers, but has the Shen Showstoppers in Clifton Park, Guilderland Ballet, and continuing education classes in Colonie, Niskayuna and Schenectady.

The Timeless Tappers are centered at the Colonie Senior Service Center at Beltrone Living Center off Wolf Road in Colonie. There is no age (or sex) restriction to join. They practice in the Fran Guiliano Studio, named after their founder and benefactor.

"We're all like a family," Janet says. "I try to make my classes close to each other (in time and place) so we help each other in difficult times.

"It's a dance family. It's as much a social association as a dance group."

For the Tappers, Janet has four classes, 25 dancers on three levels, and jazz dance ("more for balance and motions") with some crossover.

Janet will direct the Miss Empire Rose/Miss Albany Pageant in March. One past winner was Elisabeth Baldan who was Miss New York in 2007 and Miss America in 2008.

On the schedule this season have been a TV Christmas show, the Victorian Stroll in Troy, a show at the Center for the Disabled and Stratton Veterans Administration Hospital.

"Sometime I'd like to get all my groups together and do a big show with the all of proceeds going to charity."

A recent highlight was dancing with an alumni group of the Rockettes at the Hotel Pierre which

Evoskevich is professor of saxophone and jazz studies at Saint Rose. The graduate of Hartt School and Eastmn School of Music has performed with numerous orchestras and luminaries: Louis Bellson, Sarah Vaughan, Teresa Brewer, Bob Mintzer, Bill

Cunliffe, Paul Anka, Liza Minnelli, Joel Grey, Johnny Mathis, the Four Tops, the Temptations and Ben Vereen. He has extensive experience recording for television and radio jingles and is an active performer of classical repertoire and jazz.

Saxman Frank Loscavo Making Mark

Frank Loscavo is no stranger to audiences at Swingtime Jazz Society events. The saxophonist frequently sits in, and fits in, with the best players.

He has impressive credentials. Professionally, he has worked with **Nat Phipps, Cliff Brucker, Otto Gardner, John Menegon** and **Pete Toigo**. In the Syracuse area, he has worked with Mike Solazzo, bass, and Dave Solazzo, his pianist son.

Among his inspirations were some he heard at the Dinkler, a hotel known for good music (especially pianists) in Syracuse: Earl "Fatha" Hines, Teddy Wilson and Marian McPartland, with Frank's friend the drummer **George Reed** backing them. Frank sat in with them

Early influences were Blood, Sweat and Tears, alto saxophonist Arnie Lawrence, Phil Woods and Fred Lipsius.

He studied with the great Phil Woods, delving into major, minor, diminished and augmented; with saxophonists Gerry Santy and Sal Nistico; with Joe Raposo, alto, composer and arranger. He still studies and practices four hours a day.


A friend and colleague is **Frank Stagnitta**, a Syracuse pianist well known to Capital District listeners from his many dates here in the salad days of live jazz.

Frank swings in Loscavo's fine album "As Is," with friends Stagnitta, Reed and bassist Dave Arenius (the group Hi Fly), a fine quartet indeed. The tunes are "Diane," a Stagnitta original; "Stolen Moments," "Willow Weep for Me," "Naima" (Coltrane) and "Fungi Mama." (This is not the "Diane" by Diane Steinberg, a vastly underrated singer.)
