**Peg Delaney Trio** at Grappa '72. The pianist spun an electric "I'll Remember April" and stomped on "Route 66."

Restaurant manager Tom Buckley sang "Summer Wind" and "That's All." "Oh, What a Beautiful Morning" was given an original and humorous treatment. It was most unusual and enjoyed immensely by the listeners. The trio did a lovely tooseldom heard "Let's Take a Walk Around the Block" by Harold Arlen. We were treated twice by the ever cheerful drummer-vocalist **Earl Davis** to Mel Tormé impresssions, which I liked better than his patented Tony Bennett stylings. Bassist **Bill Delaney** was excellent throughout. As usual.

Sensemaya won loud ovations at a sparkling A Place for Jazz concert in Schenectady. Pianist-leader **David Glea**son topped it all with a brilliant sweeping classical solo after an added treat, the Central Park Youth Jazz Ensemble led by **Rob Aronstein** at intermission. We were impressed by **Pete Sweeney** employing the full set of drums then just bare hands a la conga on "Sofrico."

The rhythm was certainly huge, with Tony Garcia Jr. on congas, Tony Sr. on bongos and Walter Ramos on various percussion. It was too dominant at times. Trumpeter Pete Giroux, Tim Williams, reeds, Erik Johnson on bass and Ben O'Shea on trombone were all excellent on leads and ensemble.

## Olsen a true master of music

**Tim Olsen** is active as composer, performer, and educator. Born in 1961 in St. Paul, Minnesota, his early training involved playing trumpet in marching, concert, and jazz bands.

Olsen began writing and arranging for these groups and picked up piano by ear. He went on to earn a bachelor of music *(summa cum laude)* in music theory and composition from Washington University in St. Louis (1983), a master of arts in music theory and composition from the University of Minnesota (1985), and master of music (1988), master of musical arts (1989), and doctor of musical arts (1995) in composition from Yale University.

As a Fulbright Scholar in 1990-91, Olsen studied with composer Ib Nørholm at the Royal Danish Conservatory of Music in Copenhagen. Olsen joined the faculty of Union College in Schenectady in 1994 where he is currently associate professor of music. He teaches courses in the music and culture of the United States, Latin America, and Africa; music theory; and jazz improvisation.

Olsen is also director of the Union College Jazz Ensemble. As a jazz pianist and trumpeter, Olsen has played in concerts, clubs, and private venues throughout the United States and in Denmark.

The Tim Olsen Band varies in size from a quartet/quintet to an 18-piece big band. Olsen also regularly collaborates with the Albany-based Joey Thomas Big Band, for whom he has produced over 60 arrangements and original compositions. Olsen is also organist/choirmaster at St. George's Episcopal Church in Clifton Park.

# Cats and Jammers

Half-Notes

A lively bunch sat in at the autumn Swingtime Jazz Society jam session at Provence Restaurant in Stuvvesant Plaza. A first-time guest was the fine young clarinetist Greg Razzano. I think you'll be seeing a lot more of him. There was the Double Delaney (Stan Marsden's label) of pianist Peg and bassist Bill; always reliable drummer Tim Coakley; saxophonist Lew Petteys, singer Patti Melita, bop singer Maggie Mac-Dougall and bassist Pete Toigo. When one of the featured players, Otto Gardner, sat in on bass, some wag asked, "Is this baseball?" No. "Well then, why do you have a third bass?"

During Nancy Donnelly's concert, the singer dazzled us with Annie Ross' 1959 "Twisted." She delivered a poignant hearttugger, Fred Jacuse's "For All We Know," which received excellent trio backing by Gardner, pianist Peter Tomlinson and That, by the by, drummer Peter O'Brien. gave us а threepeat: Petes Toigo, Tomlinson and O'Brien. The lovely vocalist gave us groovy bop singing on Dizzy Gillespie's "Night in Tunisia," a torchy "Black Coffee" and a beautiful "The Real Thing" (Mulligan-Tormé).

The **Roger Held** Trio plays 6 to 9 Wednesdays - Saturdays at the 677 Prime upscale restaurant downtown Albany . . . The trio of Lew Petteys, reeds; **Dino Cimino**, bass; and Roger Held, piano, played a nice gig at Provence in Stuyvesant Plaza.

at D'Raymonds, where they serve no "bar" brands (just Beefeater, Bombay, like that). Beff's is a good bargain, \$6, and tied with D'Raymonds for size (large).

How refreshing: Half-time of Southern University-Florida A&M had all bands marching (spectacular) and no washed-out talking heads telling us what we'd already seen.

Roger Williams, whose "Autumn Leaves" is the largest selling piano recording of all time, is swinging now as witnessed on Aug. 20 PBS fundraiser. Oscar Peterson won't have to move over, but it's damn pleasant improvisation. . . Frankie Laine (then 91) was shown in a final appearance, so the show itself must be two years old.

The current Four Freshmen were wonderful. Trombonist Bob Flanigan, major influence on **Tom Shields**, was the owner of the quartet until his recent passing. The last member of the original Frosh died in late August in Simi Valley, Calif. Ross Barbour was the pixie who sang the chirpy "Sweet Lorraine" (dee dippie dippie doo).

**Pat Testo**, long-time mixologist at the Golden Fox in its heyday, died at age 84 after a long illness. The amiable bartender later operated Testo's Pizzeria in Clifton Park. Rest in Peace.

'Twas a treat to hear on Ch. 1267, in succession, vocalists Sara Lazarus, Stacey Kent (today's Joannie Sommers) and Bea Wain. . . Add to groovy titles: Artie Shaw's "Aesop's Foibles" . . . Clarinetist Barney Bigard once said Artie Shaw was the all-time greatest jazz musician.



## **Cohoes Music Hall Sparkles**

Unbelievable. Incredible. Fantastic. Just a few of the words you heard after the first act of "Les Miserables" at Cohoes Music Hall in November. And the second act was equally astounding.

This is theater by children as young as 9! And a couple of youths in college. Costumes and settings were of the usual professional quality.

**Caroline Codd**, Niskayuna High senior, as Fantine was sensational in singing, acting and looks. She, **Nick Martiniano** (Valjean) and **Kelly Swint** (a Shaker High senior as Cosette) excelled in difficult three-part singing. **Matthew Gariepy** (a Cohoes HS senior) and **Bailey Anne Medici** (a Shaker junior) were properly malicious as the greedy innkeeper and spouse. Ensemble singing and dancing were stunning. Considering that voices are not amplified at Cohoes, the solos are all the more remarkable.

Bassist **Dan Cordell** blared some groovy trombone in tavern scenes and the orchestra led by **Ming Aldrich-Gan** was good throughout.

Terry Gibbs in his book "Good Vibes" says Al Porcino was the best lead trumpet he'd ever heard. (First trumpet is often not the best soloist, but is often the best reader and surest leader.) He'd had many soloists including Shorty Rogers and Conte Candoli. (Thanks to **Tim Coakley** for the book loan.) ... **Dick Kissinger**, father of **Dr. R. David Kissinger** who teaches jazz classes for OASIS, was

bassist and singer with the Isham Jones orchestra.

There are about a dozen lady singers to every male on Channel 1267. Very impressed again by old-timers Marlene Ver-Plank (Billy VerPlank's wife and the lead in the John LaSalle Quartet), Ethel Ennis and Marilyn Maye (Vermonter), and newer talents Renee Olstead, Kelly Harland, Christine Ebersole, Melissa Collard and Patti Austin.

Don Redman's Chocolate Dandies record of "Six or Seven Times" has one of the first bop vocals (Redman's). . . Jelly Roll Morton claimed his "Hello Central, Get Me Dr. Jazz" (about 1920) was the first jazz arrangement. . . James Reese Europe's band gave a Carnegie Hall concert of ragtime, early jazz and military music. In 1911! Thanks to Dr. Kissinger for those facts.
